

June 23, 2024 Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Parishioner of Our Lady Star of the Sea,

"Give thanks to the Lord, his love is everlasting" (Psalm 107:1). We are invited to turn to and to trust in the love of the Lord. Thankfully, in that love do we find our peace and in that love does Jesus say: "Quiet! Be still!" (see Mark 4:35-41).

These words of Jesus are the turning point of today's Gospel account of the calming of the storm. I often ask myself in what tone did the Lord say these words. Did he yell out fiercely against the winds and waves like some deranged King Lear? No. I imagine that he barely whispered. With no effort at all, the wind and the seas obey. As foretold in the book of Job (see Job 38:1, 8-11) of the Lord's power: "here shall your proud waves be stilled." As it was on the waves that day on the Sea of Galilee, so is it in the tempest of times today. Jesus is our surest peace.

His love is everlasting. It is in the newness of life that is Jesus' way, that we find our real power to confront the storms of life. It is not by our railing against the foes of people or circumstance that we prevail, but by following in the calm peace of the Lord each day, finding in him the inner strength to see our way through everything by relying on the strength of God's love. St. Paul (see 2 Cor 5:14-17) reveals to us: "So whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come." Let us be "in Christ" and in new ways face and conquer whatever it may be that life throws our way!

"The Love of Christ impels us" (see 2Cor 5:14-17). The tumult in the society around us and the violence of the world situation ask of us a generous engagement. For these two weeks leading up to July Fourth celebrations, Catholics might well consider our role as believers in society and the contribution we are called to make to change our world for the better. How important it is to take make some time of prayer, study and good conversation, asking ourselves and each other what the proper role of religion and of believers should be in the context of the particular society that is ours today. We are not asked to engage in political sloganism of any sort. We are not being asked to pressure people towards one or another solution to the complex problems that our country faces more and more often. We are asked to turn to the Lord who has appointed us to prepare his way and to get our world ready to meet its ultimate destiny, to achieve its greatest purpose in and through God's loving plan of salvation. We are asked to talk about our role as believers in society. We are asked to consider what the best course of action would be for our religious communities and, especially, our Catholic Church, in offering some-thing of our very best to the work of building up our society and our world.

This Sunday is the first of astronomical Summer. All of our students are now out of school and enter vacation with eager spirit. Vacation is a precious time. It is especially valuable as an opportunity to spend time, care and enjoyment *with* loved ones and friends, celebrating *who* we are in the light of that love, and in the love of God. It would be a terrible loss, one that will, unfortunately, be followed by many of our neighbors, to celebrate vacation only by indulging in the "whats" of life: what I have, what I do, what I can go to see, or what I am worth or what can I command from others. Such pursuits are a celebration of pretense, mostly. Rather, a good vacation gives opportunity to highlight and rediscover our true *identity* by entering more deeply into the love of family members and friends and, mostly, by taking time to deepen our relationship with God. Spend Summer well, my friends. Your soul with thank you come Fall!!

Comments from Deacon Joe

"Holiday Season" ends

<u>With the Solemnities</u> of the St. John the Baptist and Sts. Peter and Paul our church "holiday season," as I like to call it, comes to and end. See below.

Catholic Appeal The latest report indicates that as a parish



we have not yet met our financial goal or our participation goal for the annual Catholic Appeal. This appeal is the main source of funding for all the ministries and operations of the Archdiocese of Boston. Some of it benefits us directly, some of it indi-

rectly, and some of it goes to provide for the needs of our fellow Catholics elsewhere in the archdiocese. To meet our goals, we still need 44 individuals to participate and we are several thousand dollars short of the goal for contributions from Star of the Sea. The Nativity (birth) of St. John the Baptist He is considered

the last and greatest of the prophets before the coming of Christ. His role was to prepare the people for the appearance of Christ and to point to him as the Lamb of God, who would take away the sins of the world. He's also my patron saint. We can be like John when we help people to see where we need to convert — to change our way of life — and to recognize Jesus as our savior. This can be a mission both to ourselves and to those around us. We celebrate this solemnity on June 24 https://en.uri

The Solemnity of Sts. Peter and Paul, the two principal

apostles, is celebrated on June 29. Jesus designated Peter as the rock on which he would build his church and asked him to confirm the faith of his brothers in the apostolate. After proclaiming the faith in the Holy Land and in Antioch, he came to Rome, where he was martyred, probably in the 60's. The popes are his succes-



sors as Bishop of Rome <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/</u> Saint Peter.

St. Paul was converted to the faith by a vision of Christ. He became a powerful preacher of the gospel, being especially effective in spreading the faith among Gentiles in the territories along the northern coast of the Mediterranean Sea from Syria to Rome, and perhaps to Spain. He was also martyred in Rome in the 60's https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Paul the Apostle.

As we honor these two great apostles, we can remind ourselves that we as a Church and as individuals should have a similar zeal and be alert to the promptings of the Holy Spirit showing us how we should make the love of God known in our world.

This week The Memorial of St. Irenaeus is on June 28. He



had been a disciple of St. Polycarp, who was a disciple of St. John the Evangelist. He traveled to Lyons and became bishop of that city, where he was martyred around the year 202. He wrote valuable works defending the faith against the heresies of his day and developing the faith, including which books are part of sacred scripture. He is

considered a Doctor of the Church <u>https://</u> en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Irenaeus.
